Queen Elizabeth's Memorial



Reading Rewards



We awarded our first 'Half Termly Good Reader Award' when we came back to school after the October holidays. 20 students in Year 7,8 and 9 who had completed the most Accelerated Reader quizzes and read the most books on our online library 'myOn' received a £5 National Book Token.

In total students read 982 books on myOn and took 1090 quizzes on Accelerated Reader.





Women in Leadership Seminar





Sixth Form students were invited to The National Literacy Trust's Words for Work seminar. It is a women in leadership programme that helps young women to develop the literacy skills, leadership abilities and confidence they need to achieve their potential.




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Christmas Reading Recommendations

<u>Letters from Father Christmas</u> <u>by J.R.R. Tolkien</u>

Synopsis: Every December an envelope bearing a stamp from the North Pole would arrive for J.R.R.Tolkien's children. Inside would be a letter in strange spidery handwriting and a beautiful coloured drawing or some sketches. The letters were from Father Christmas. They told wonderful tales of life at the North Pole: how all the reindeer got loose and scattered presents all over the place; how the accidentprone Polar Bear climbed the North Pole and fell through the roof of Father Christmas's house into the dinina-room: how he broke the Moon into four pieces and made the Man in it fall into the back garden; how there were wars with the troublesome horde of goblins who lived in the caves beneath the house! Sometimes the Polar Bear would scrawl a note, and sometimes llbereth the Elf would write in his elegant flowing script, adding yet more life and humour to the stories. No reader, young or old, can fail to be charmed by the inventiveness and 'authenticity' of Tolkien's Letters from Father Christmas.






Christmas Reading Recommendations
