
appreciated by pupils, and being led by a passionate member of staff.'

The library has a new 'Inclusivity' and 'Wellbeing' section. To celebrate World Mental Health Day, our Sixth Form



On the 12th of October we celebrated National Harry Potter Book Day. The library created a magical display had lots of activities on at break and lunch.






Remembrance Day






Staff Reading—CPD

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




Christmas Reading Recommendations

For the first time ever, William feels very different from his friends and he becomes miserable. On Christmas Eve, the two cross paths in the most unexpected way, leading them to embark on the adventure of a lifetime and build a friendship that will change them both forever.

Y8: A Boy Called Christmas by Matt Haig



GCSE: The Christmas Bookshop by Jenny Colgan



Carmen's sister Sofia comes to her somewhat reluctant rescue when Carmen is made redundant. *The Christmas Bookshop* goes to the top of my favourite books by Jenny Colgan, she is one of the most consistently fabulous romance writers out there, and if I need a boost I know just where to head. Yes there's romance, you'll also find intriguing family relationships and inviting new friendships. When we meet Carmen she's not at her best, she's definitely not perfect (who is!), and because she's multi-dimensional it adds extra layers to this Christmas tale. I particularly loved the cast of characters, even the smallest part has depth, and then of course there is the Bookshop, which is divinely intriguing and welcoming. Edinburgh becomes a winter wonderland, with snow, beautifully decorated shops, and even if you've never been, the descriptions ensure a spellbinding sparkle.


<u>A Level The Gift by Cecelia Ahern</u>

<u>Synopsis</u>: The annual Christmas Game is afoot at Endgame House, the Armitages' grand family home. Now, Lily must compete with her estranged cousins for the twelve days of Christmas. The snow is thick, the phone lines are down, and no one is getting in or out. Lily will have to keep her wits about her, because not everyone is playing fair, and there's no telling how many will die before the winner is declared.
